MESSAGE FROM THE SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT, *David Kurlinkus*

Last month I was privileged to attend the unveiling of a monument that is on the south entrance of the new fieldhouse. Mid-States Concrete Industries is a company located in South Beloit and is a contractor working on the fieldhouse project. The precast panels that are on the outside of the building, including the brick surfaces, were manufactured by Mid-States. Mid-States's president, Hagen Harker, wanted to give something back to the District as part of their participation in the construction.

As you walk through the new entrance to Kelsey Field and to the fieldhouse, you will see a brick structure on your left that has large stone-like panels with the Hononegah Chief logo on either side. Those panels, etched with laser technology at Mid-States, were donated by the company to be part of the project. The logos match the much larger one etched on the glass panels on the opposite side of the building and make a great addition to the entrance. They also show what 21st Century technology can do compared to the Ho-no-ne-gah concrete sign near the main entrance that was part of the original 1922 building.

As I spoke with Hagen, who was accompanied by his father Charles, the founder of the company, and several members of his staff, we discussed the importance of the project and how it affects the Hononegah community. I learned that 42 Mid-States employees are residents of the Hononegah District. They are taxpayers here, and they are benefitting from being employed by a local company doing business with the District.

As Hagen and I discussed prior to taking the wraps off the monument, we spoke about the importance of community to the school. I made sure to emphasize to him that the full name of the school is Hononegah Community High School and that we welcomed him and his company to that community. Hagen stated that it was important for his company to become involved in Hononegah's development, not only as a contractor hired to work on a job, but also to give back to a project where his employees live, hence, the donation of the monument.

That fieldhouse is going to be there for a long time, likely many years beyond when many reading these words will no longer be here, so it's important that we do it right. I know that Superintendent Mike Dugan, Assistant Superintendent Kim Suedbeck and former Superintendent Lynn Gibson have spent, and will continue to spend, countless hours in meetings reviewing plans and monitoring progress on the building. We all want to see that the project stays on time and on (hopefully under) budget and that it will become a true source of pride for the Hononegah community.

As I have said many times before, our primary goal is to provide the best education possible for our students. Buildings, even beautiful new ones, are of little value if that educating doesn't take place inside of them. This project, supported by the community that created the high school in 1922, will be a great addition to school and community for generations to come.

Our regular Board meetings are on the third Wednesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the school library. PARENT/TEACHER CONFERENCES

BUS TRANSPORTATION

Hononegah Community High School, along with First Student, provides transportation to one address for each student who qualifies for busing. We do not allow students to ride any bus other than their assigned one. We do not sign notes to allow a student to ride a different bus route other than their own. With the anticipated disruption to drop-off and pick-up areas around Hononegah due to construction, we strongly encourage parents to have students ride the bus to limit expected congestion. If you have an emergency situation it must be arranged through Kelly Rosik in the Principal's Office at 815-624-5005.

DO YOU KNOW HONONEGAH HAS EARLY BIRD BUS ROUTES?

Do you need to arrive early to school? All Hononegah students have access to Early Bird Bus routes. These routes are designed like city routes with established stops. There are five routes, and the routes and a map are posted on the school's website. They are also displayed at the student entrances, in the principal's office, the SSS Office, Library and DA Office. The routes run Monday through Friday each week. The routes are available to all students who want to arrive early to school to receive help from their teachers, take a 1st hour class, eat breakfast, serve detention, study in the Library or attend referred study hall.

LATE START DAYS

It is important to note that there are four remaining late start days for 2018-2019:

December 13, February 7, March 14 and April 25. On late start days, first hour begins at **9:20 a.m.** and second hour begins at **10:05 a.m.** Students are released from school at 3:15 p.m.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION UNIFORM

Students are required to dress in a full PE uniform each day for class. This includes wearing sport appropriate gym or fitness shoes. Please note: Spandex yoga pants are not part of the approved Hononegah PE uniform. The official provider of PE uniforms is American Bell in Roscoe.

REPORT CARD REMINDER FOR 2018-2019 SCHOOL YEAR

All student grades are available through Family Access at anytime. The instructions for Family Access are available on Hononegah's website.

ATTENTION JUNIOR (2020) PARENTS

The Illinois Department of Public Health requires students, upon entering the sixth and the twelfth grade of any public, private, or parochial school, to receive an immunization containing meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4) in accordance with the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). The immunization requirement consists of one dose of the MCV4 vaccine for 6th grade entrance and 2 doses for 12th grade entrance, unless the first dose was administered to a child who was 16 years of age or older, in which case, only one dose would be required at 12th grade entrance. Hononegah Community High School participates in first day exclusion so this immunization will be required for 2019-2020 Senior students. Please call the Nurse's Office with any questions 815-624-5002. **The meningococcal vaccine may be given anytime during junior year.** This documentation can be brought to the nurse's office as soon as you receive it.

SSS OFFICE INFORMATION

Senior students completing scholarship applications during winter break need to be aware of the following deadlines if the application requires a letter of recommendation, school report or transcript.

NEED A LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION OR SCHOOL REPORT COMPLETED?

Any students who will be submitting scholarship applications that are due December 21 – January 18, need to submit the 10 Day Counselor Request Form by December 6 to request school reports or letters of recommendation from their School Counselor. This form can be submitted online from the Student Support Services website. Letters of recommendation and school reports can be picked up 10 school days after submitting the 10 Day Counselor Request Form.

NEED A TRANSCRIPT?

Students who need their transcript may print or send the transcript electronically from their parchment account, www.parchment.com.

School days are days that school is in session. Vacations, breaks and weekends do not count as school days.

ROCK VALLEY COLLEGE

Class of 2019 seniors planning to attend Rock Valley College (RVC) in the fall need to be aware that fall course selection begins in April. Prior to selecting classes, the student needs to:

1. Submit an RVC enrollment form (online at <http://www.rockvalleycollege.edu/Admission/app.cfm>)
2. Request your transcript and ACT score be sent electronically from your Parchment account. (www.parchment.com)
3. Take the Accuplacer Test at RVC if required by RVC Admission Office (testing schedule is online at www.rockvalleycollege.edu/placementtest or call 815-921-2380).
4. Attend a Tech Connect session (register online at <http://apps.rockvalleycollege.edu/EPS-Reg/>). Call 815-921-4094 for assistance.
5. Schedule an individual appointment with an RVC Academic Advisor, call 815-921-4100. The Advisor will identify classes that you can register for to help you meet your goals.
6. Register for fall classes in April. Check the RVC website for the first day of registration for incoming freshman in the fall of 2019.

SCHOLARSHPS

Hononegah seniors who will be attending college in the fall of 2019 are encouraged to check out the scholarship resources available through the Student Support Services (SSS) Office.

SCHOLARSHIP LIST

The Financial Aid/Scholarships tab is where students can find the Scholarship List. This list includes scholarships with both paper and online applications.

SCHOLARSHIP DRAWER

The Scholarship Drawer is in the SSS Office and is open to all students and their parents when the office is open. As paper applications are received, they are placed in the Scholarship Drawer.

There are a limited number of scholarships that freshmen, sophomores and juniors can apply for on the Scholarship List. Contests/competitions that are open to underclassmen are marked with the appropriate grade level.

Follow the Paper-path Road: Exploring the Impact of Decision-making in Life **2017-18 Grant Recipient Spotlight**

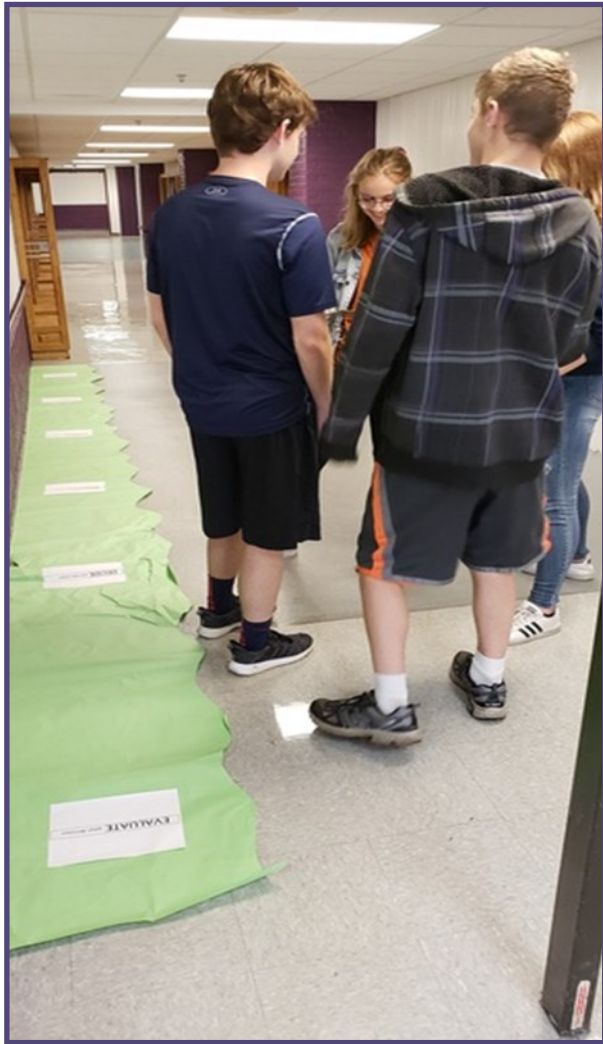
Advanced Health teacher Ms. Heather Plourde has designed a program that allows student teams to explore the opportunities and consequences of decision making in life. Each team is given a card that outlines a life scenario – like : You are at a party. You may or may not have been drinking, but all of your friends are, including your designated driver. You told your parents your friend would drive you home tonight. Everyone is ready to leave ...How do you approach this? **OR** You just got your driver's license and are finally allowed to drive your father's car. You and your friend are late to a birthday party at The Cheesecake Factory. Once you pull into a parking spot your friend swings open the door and...Bang! They just dented the side of the car next to you. You are in such a rush; how do you approach this?

Then the students work together to decide what to do next, that decision moves the team along a paper path that leads to a result or consequence. The paper paths bring the program to life as the teams advance in the direction assigned according to the decision made. The goal of the program is to explore and realize the impact of a decision—simple or complex—on self, others and the environment. The program consists of 10 different life scenarios.

Ms. Plourde requested funding from the HOPE Foundation for reams of color paper that paved the hallway paths. Such a simple request added a colorful, exciting element to a valuable program. In addition to the paper, the Foundation also funded the purchase of earplugs to support hearing loss disability simulation and awareness for the same course.
